Poetry is best enjoyed by listening to it. In <u>epic!</u> you'll find all kinds of books written in rhyme or that have a collection of poems. If you choose 'Listen and Read Along', then pick 'poetry' under 'Format' you'll see 10 books from their collection. I highly recommend <u>I Know</u> <u>an Old Lady Who Swallowed a Fly!</u> and <u>A Full Moon is Rising</u> by Marilyn Sanger. Speaking of things up in the sky, did you know that Tuesday is 'Look up at the Sky Day'? Friday is 'Haiku Poetry Day' too!

Second and Third Grades:

In honor of poetry month, I have some poetry-related activities for you this week. First stop: BrainPop Jr.'s video on <u>writing poems</u>. (Remember: username is mersdessex and password is essex) Try one of the poem types in the 'Word Play' section after watching the video.
