### **Suggested Library Activities**

### Kindergarten & First Grade:

We've been reading biographies and have marveled at all that these folks have accomplished despite challenges, obstacles and setbacks. Reading biographies opens windows to the world and gives us mirrors of reflection to our own lives. I encourage families to read biographies together and to talk about what makes these people remarkable. All kinds of books can be found on <u>Epicl</u> and <u>Reading AtoZ</u> as well as the ebooks and audiobooks available through the <u>Burnham Library</u>.

### Second Grade:

We've been learning about the organization of the library and the importance of the call number on books. Most call numbers don't have numbers! Most have two lines of text: the top line helps you know what kind of book it is. Uppercase B means it's a biography; an E means it's an easy fiction; an F means it's a fiction, or chapter book; and BC means it's a biography collection, like a book about the US presidents. When you do see numbers on the top line that means that it is a nonfiction book. The bottom line contains three letters which come, most times, from the author's last name. The exception is biographies. The three letters there come from the subject's last name. See the attachment labeled '**Call Number Matching #1 and 2**' for some fun call number matching activities. I think you'll recognize some names!

### Third Grade:

The third graders have been learning about the Dewey Decimal System, but I've attached some activities relative to the Destiny Catalog. We could all use practice using our catalog! See 'The Destiny Catalog Review' attachment above.

### Fourth Grade:

Primary sources have been the focus for the fourth graders. I'm encouraging families to find an old photo or object and to go through the three steps in analyzing the item. Parents, please don't give your child too much information about it until *after* they've analyzed it! You will also find some images from the Library of Congress site you can analyze as well. See '**Primary Source Analysis Worksheet**' attached.

### Fifth Grade:

We've been working on our Dream Job Projects. I encourage students to interview family members about their jobs, whether they consider them to be dream jobs or not. (Please use the phone when reaching out to senior citizen members of the family.) What are the features of the job: wages? education?, training?, etc?



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
